## **Digital Antiquity**

**Digital Perspectives for Ancient Texts** 

Digital technology is becoming an essential research tool in the field of humanities. For a long time, Latin and Greek texts have entered the digital age and are the subject of numerous reflections based on these tools. In the era of automatic language processing, artificial intelligence and programming, one may wonder about the place that can be reserved for the Classics in this field of research. However, through their efficiency, Digital Humanities offer numerous solutions, new tools and new problems in the study of ancient texts. In publishing, philological reflection or literary interpretations, digital technology invites the researcher to rethink his method and his approach to the text, which no longer becomes a distant and total entity, but a set of manipulable data, with which a real interaction can take place. The day is co-organized by the ArSCAn research center (Archaeology and Sciences of Antiquity) of Paris-Nanterre and the EDITTA research team of Sorbonne-University (Edition, Interpretation and Translation of Ancient Texts), which have made these issues one of their research perspectives.


